We elevate Queensland's visitor economy by uniting, innovating, and accelerating the collective power of our industry – transforming individual success into statewide prosperity.

Our vision

To be the trusted voice that champions Queensland as the undisputed leader in the global visitor economy by 2045 – where every member thrives, every experience inspires, and every community prospers.

Our objectives and functions

The Queensland Tourism Industry Council (QTIC) is the peak body and trusted voice for Queensland's visitor economy. We unite operators, regions and partners to champion a sustainable, inclusive and resilient industry, and to ensure tourism's value is understood across government, business and community. Our purpose is to elevate Queensland's visitor economy by turning collective ambition into real-world outcomes for members and the state.

As a not-for-profit, membership-based organisation, our advocacy is anchored in evidence and member insight. We lead policy development and represent the sector in decision-making forums, while promoting tourism's contribution to jobs, regional vitality and Queensland's long-term prosperity. We collaborate closely with government, Tourism and Events Queensland, Regional and Local Tourism Organisations, Associations, education and industry partners to align effort and maximise impact, including towards Destination 2045 and the Green and Gold Runway opportunities.

Our objectives

- Deliver powerful, outcomes-focused advocacy on the sector's most material issues: sustainable industry funding; relief from rising business costs (including insurance); investment in tourism infrastructure; a skilled and resilient workforce; and growth in ecotourism and sustainable practices.
- Build industry capability and workforce, expanding programs in accreditation, compliance, leadership, micro-credentials and inclusive employment, and strengthening First Nations participation and pathways.
- Provide clear member value through tailored engagement, practical tools and timely advice that turn individual success into industry-wide prosperity.
- Champion sustainability, resilience and innovation, embedding data, technology and climate resilience across policy and programs.

What we do

- Policy and representation: prepare submissions, lead regulatory reform agendas and convene targeted engagements (e.g., boardroom briefings, advisory groups) to progress solutions.
- Insight and evidence: run pulse surveys, maintain an issues register and data portal, and partner on research to inform credible positions.
- Programs and capability: deliver workforce and skilling initiatives, business development and accreditation support, including First Nations tourism development and cultural capability.
- Sector convening and visibility: facilitate state-wide forums and networks, and amplify member and industry stories across channels to reinforce tourism's value.

Chief Executive Officer's report

2024–25 has been a year of transition and renewed focus for the Queensland Tourism Industry Council. A change in leadership in December 2024 coincided with significant strategic work for Queensland's visitor economy and for QTIC itself.

Sincere thanks are due to outgoing CEO Brett Fraser for steering QTIC with steadiness and care. Under Brett's leadership, the new QTIC website, investment in a new CRM and the Queensland Data Dashboard powered by Localis all began and have continued to progress towards delivery to better serve our members.

The leadership transition aligned with the Queensland Government's Destination 2045 consultation program. QTIC was represented at every session so we could hear, firsthand, what industry was sharing and needing. Thank you to every operator, council, Traditional Owner, regional and local tourism organisation, and partner who met with us – from the Tropical North to the Outback, the Fraser Coast to the Gold Coast, and across our islands and hinterlands.

These engagements informed the Destination 2045 process and directly shaped QTIC's own priorities. They clarified where the organisation should lead or convene, and they reinforced our members-first test in decision-making. The breadth of voices underscored the diversity and ingenuity of Queensland's visitor economy and the strength of our regional tourism network. We are, quite simply, stronger together.

This year has been about foundations and focus. QTIC's strategy was refreshed and an Advocacy Plan for FY26 was finalised. That membersfirst lens now guides what is prioritised, how we partner and how we measure success.

From conversations across every corner of Queensland, common priorities emerged. QTIC will continue to prosecute these on behalf of members:

- Sustainable industry funding and predictable, long-term investment settings.
- Insurance affordability, disaster resilience and recovery, including better risk settings for regional and nature-based operators.
- Workforce and housing: attraction, retention, skills pathways and practical solutions in highpressure regions.
- Aviation capacity and regional connectivity, including route development and airport enablement.
- Tourism infrastructure and product investment, especially nature-based, cultural and experience-led assets.
- First Nations tourism growth, with community-led pathways and procurement opportunities.
- Regulatory efficiency and approvals that enable rather than impede investment.
- Digital, data and sustainability capabilities to improve decisions, productivity and climate adaptation.



To lift member value and impact:

- The website and member portal were advanced, and investment in a CRM will help personalise support and streamline engagement.
- The Queensland Data Dashboard (Localis) progressed so members can access timely insights to guide business decisions.
- Policy capability was strengthened and targeted boardroom briefings were convened to move solutions forward.
- Collaboration with industry partners and the regional tourism network was deepened to align effort and avoid duplication.
- First Nations leadership and participation continued to be embedded across programs, including co-design work that will inform the Queensland First Nations Tourism Plan 2026–2032.

The opportunity in front of Queensland is significant – from Destination 2045 implementation to the Green and Gold Runway towards 2032. Realising this opportunity will require collaboration, clear priorities and disciplined delivery. QTIC will:

- Implement the FY26 Advocacy Plan with a focus on measurable outcomes.
- Keep decisions anchored in a members-first test.
- Use data and evidence to sharpen policy

positions.

 Continue to work statewide, shoulderto-shoulder with operators, RTOs/LTOs, government and industry partners.

None of this happens without the QTIC team. From policy and advocacy to accreditation, workforce programs, First Nations tourism, events, member services, communications and operations, the team's commitment has been immense. They have listened, travelled, convened, problem-solved and delivered – often after hours and in challenging conditions – to support members in every corner of Queensland. Their care for the work and the pride they take in serving our industry are deeply appreciated.

To our members, thank you for your trust and candour. To Brett, thank you for a strong handover. To our Board, thank you for your guidance. It is a privilege to lead Queensland's peak body for tourism. Together, we will turn opportunity into outcomes for operators, communities and visitors across this extraordinary state.

MEMBERSHIP

During the financial year, QTIC focused on supporting members by tackling workforce challenges, strengthening business capability and ensuring industry priorities were heard by those shaping policy. Operators were provided one-on-one workforce support for operators, and hosted regional networking events to help industry connect, grow and influence positive change.

During 2024–2025, QTIC's membership program focused on practical, on-the-ground support: tackling workforce pressures, strengthening business capability and ensuring industry priorities were heard. Members accessed one-on-one workforce assistance, regional networking events and targeted advocacy that helped them navigate change and plan for growth.

With workforce constraints and rising operating costs, members needed support that was local, responsive and easy to access. QTIC expanded programs and resources to help businesses attract and retain staff, build management capability and identify new market opportunities.

Developing the future workforce was a major priority. QTIC welcomed the Gateway to Industry Schools program, deepening links between schools, students and operators. The program introduces young people to tourism careers while giving businesses a clearer pipeline of talent, complementing existing workforce initiatives and addressing long-term skills needs.

Advocacy remained central. QTIC represented the industry in key government forums and

helped secure major Federal commitments, including \$9 billion for Bruce Highway upgrades and \$250 million to protect natural areas, supporting safer travel, regional connectivity and the appeal of Queensland's landscapes.

Member services continued to evolve. A new website and portal made it easier to access information, events and programs, while new benefits such as Localis data insights helped operators use current market intelligence for pricing, product development and marketing.

Engagement deepened statewide. Networking events and boardroom lunches in Cairns, the Whitsundays and South East Queensland brought members together with peers, investors and government, ensuring regional perspectives shaped QTIC's advocacy and programs.

QTIC's World Tourism Day event took place at Riverlife on the banks of the Brisbane River, following the conclusion of the Queensland Tourism Futures Mentoring Program. The evening drew more than 240 guests who came ready to exchange ideas, challenge thinking and look ahead with optimism for the future of tourism in Oueensland.

The evening's event featured addresses from the Queensland Premier and the Leader of the Opposition, who shared their perspectives on tourism priorities in the lead-up to the State Election. The evening created space for honest conversation and a renewed sense of purpose across the industry.





Tourism Leaders Breakfast March 2025

The QTIC Tourism Leaders Breakfast at Brisbane's Victoria Park welcomed more than 240 guests to discuss fresh perspectives and challenges shaping the industry. As one of QTIC's flagship events, it brought together business leaders, government representatives and tourism operators to discuss the future of the industry in Queensland.

The breakfast focused on the new opportunities created by bringing the Department of Tourism and the Department of Environment into one portfolio. The Minister for Tourism delivered a keynote address and joined a panel discussion on how this change can better align industry and environmental goals.

QTIC's accreditation program helps tourism businesses deliver their best by supporting high standards in every part of their operations. With a focus on ongoing improvement and reaching industry best practice, the program guides operators to go beyond guest expectations, strengthening their reputation and long-term success.

Throughout the year, QTIC continued to support business growth and raise industry standards through the national Quality Tourism Accreditation program in Queensland. This program helps tourism operators strengthen their operations by aligning with industry best practice and finding new ways to improve.

Accreditation offers a clear framework to review business processes, products, and services, helping operators identify where they can do better. Today, more than 615 tourism businesses across Queensland hold Quality Tourism Accreditation, showcasing the industry's strong commitment to quality and excellence.

Accessible Tourism program

An online tool that helps businesses highlight their accessible features, find ways to improve and create a personalised report to share with customers.



Camp and Adventure Accreditation program

This program helps ensure camping and adventure activities, from snorkelling to abseiling, meet the highest standards and keep safety front and centre.



Star Ratings program

An internationally recognised program, Star Ratings accreditation shows that a property meets the high, independent standards of the Australian Star Ratings system.

Risk Assessment Tool

Risk Management program

The Risk Management program helps businesses identify their unique risks and put preventative measures in place, offering a personalised risk assessment and management plan.



Tourism Emissions Reduction program

This program supports businesses to understand their carbon impact and develop a clear plan to reduce it.



To further expand operators' expertise, QTIC offered five specialised accreditation modules, including Star Ratings, Camp and Adventure, Accessible Tourism, Risk Management, and the Tourism Emissions Reduction program. Out of the 615 accredited businesses across Queensland, 398 operators enhanced their knowledge and reputation by adding extra modules to their accreditation.

This year, 170 businesses took part in the Accessible Tourism program, showing their commitment to a more inclusive and accessible Queensland, while 188 completed the *Risk Management program*, putting important measures in place to protect their business, staff, and visitors from potential crises.

As QTIC continues to champion excellence through accreditation, these efforts are helping businesses strengthen their operations and build a safer, more inclusive, and resilient tourism industry across Queensland.

QTIC continues to drive strong advocacy and informed policy development through collaboration with government and industry partners. By ensuring the needs of Queensland's tourism operators are represented in key decisions, we help create a supportive business environment that enables growth, resilience and long-term success across the sector.

Key research publications and engagement

We champion innovative research and thought leadership, partnering with members, universities and industry experts to shape the future of Queensland's visitor economy. These collaborations generate insights that drive growth, inform policy and strengthen the state's tourism industry.

- Next-Gen Visitor Economy CRC: Participated as industry advisor and bid partner in the Cooperative Research Centre application, led by Professor Sarah Gardiner (Griffith University), exploring how Al and digital innovation can transform tourism businesses.
- University of Queensland TOUR7000 Partnership: Engaged as an industry partner in the Tourism Research & Consultancy program, supporting student-led research project into new Queensland tourism product development.
- Accessible Tourism Research: Supported funding applications for the Australia-China Partnership for

- Accessible Tourism, led by Dr Jie Wang (University of Queensland), focused on inclusive and silver travel markets.
- Protected Areas Research: Collaborated with The Pew Charitable Trusts through the Queensland Tourism and Conservation Alliance on assessing the economic impacts of protected area expansion in Queensland.
- Inquiry into e-mobility safety and use: QTIC advocated for investment in infrastructure, education, and policy clarity to enhance visitor experience and position Queensland as a national leader in active transport.

ADVOCACY HIGHLIGHTS

'Fix the Bruce' campaign

Working with industry partners and following sustained advocacy for increased investment in tourism-enabling infrastructure, QTIC helped to secure a historic announcement of an additional \$7.2 billion in federal funding to upgrade the Bruce Highway.

This significant investment will not only improve safety but also enhance regional dispersal, a vital element in ensuring sustained economic returns from tourism. The Bruce Highway is a crucial artery, connecting visitors to regional communities and tourism experiences from Brisbane to Cairns. As Queensland's greatest export, tourism relies on strong, safe and reliable infrastructure.

Destination 2045 Plan

The launch of the Queensland Government's Destination 2045: Delivering Queensland's Tourism Future plan in 2025, stands as a major QTIC advocacy achievement.

Developed with strong industry input, the 20-year strategy reflects more than 80 per cent of QTIC's recommendations from the consultation process. QTIC's calls for long-term planning, regulatory streamlining, infrastructure investment, workforce development and sustainable tourism are clearly embedded in the plan.

Key wins include the new Tourism Support Hub, expanded workforce programs, significant ecotourism and First Nations initiatives, regional event investment, major accommodation growth, and innovation and sustainability measures - firmly positioning Destination 2045 as a defining advocacy highlight for QTIC.

\$250 million conservation funding

During the financial year, QTIC advanced its advocacy efforts as a founding member of the *Queensland Tourism and Conservation Alliance*, working to secure the federal government's \$250 million commitment for protected areas.

This national investment has the potential to expand public access to nature, strengthen conservation outcomes and elevate Australia's ecotourism profile ahead of the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

QTIC supported calls for Queensland to double its protected areas and backed increased ranger resources to ensure these landscapes were well managed and accessible. This work positions Queensland to benefit significantly from federal funding while safeguarding its iconic natural assets.

'Capacity for Queensland' campaign

Throughout the financial year, QTIC intensified its advocacy by launching a campaign calling for urgent action to increase Queensland's hotel capacity. With major events approaching and demand rising, QTIC warned that existing infrastructure was insufficient for the state's tourism future.

The campaign drew strong media attention, amplifying member concerns across Queensland. QTIC underscored that the state trailed global destinations, expecting only 51,000 hotel rooms by 2030, a figure far below what upcoming international visitation required.

QTIC continued urging accelerated and strategic investment to ensure Queensland remained competitive, resilient and prepared for opportunities ahead of the 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

QUEENSLAND TOURISM FUTURES MENTORING PROGRAM

The QTIC Queensland Tourism Futures Mentoring Program gives emerging tourism leaders the opportunity to fast-track their personal and professional growth by learning from experienced industry mentors.

The Queensland Tourism Futures Mentoring Program, delivered in partnership with The University of Queensland, continues to nurture the next generation of tourism leaders by pairing emerging professionals with experienced industry mentors. This year, the program introduced a new *Leadership* stream, supporting participants with strong leadership potential to expand their impact across the Queensland visitor economy.

Through mentoring sessions, hands-on activities and guided reflection, mentees developed skills in communication, leadership and strategic thinking while gaining confidence and valuable industry connections. Several former mentees and mentors returned to the program, reflecting its long-term influence and strong professional network.

Highlights from 2025 included participants stepping into leadership roles, launching new



ventures, contributing to tourism strategies and presenting at major conferences. With the generosity of mentors and the enthusiasm of mentees, the program continues to shape a skilled, confident and connected future workforce for Queensland tourism.

As one of QTIC's most inspiring annual events, the program recognises the passion, skill and commitment that drive excellence across the state's visitor economy.

In 2024, the program recognised 23 exceptional finalists who competed across five award categories during an energetic skills test day. Each finalist demonstrated impressive professionalism and enthusiasm, earning praise from industry judges and reflecting the strength of Queensland's emerging workforce.

The celebrations concluded with a gala dinner at the Pullman Brisbane, where more than 150 guests including proud families, teachers and industry leaders gathered to honour the finalists and winners. The evening was hosted by Jimmy Barker, a 2017 Salute to Excellence finalist who now serves as Chief Concierge at Emporium Hotels. His story reflects the lasting impact of the program and the valuable career pathways it helps create.

More than an awards ceremony, the Salute to Excellence program connect education and industry, offering students mentorship, networking and real-world experience that often lead to further training and employment. The program continues to strengthen Queensland's commitment to building a skilled, passionate and future-ready tourism and hospitality workforce.

INDUSTRY WORKFORCE ADVISOR PROGRAM

Established with Queensland's tourism industry in mind, the Industry Workforce Advisor program provides practical, personalised support to help businesses improve their approach to attracting and retaining a skilled workforce.

Designed specifically for Queensland's tourism industry, QTIC's Industry Workforce Advisor program continues to help small and mediumsized operators strengthen how they engage and retain skilled workers.

Throughout the financial year, the program provided hands-on support to businesses across the state, from the Scenic Rim and Outback Queensland to the tropics in the north, helping operators identify workforce challenges and develop practical, tailored solutions.

Working side by side with operators, the program helped 42 new businesses create workforce

plans, connect with grants and access new labour markets. These efforts unlocked over \$95,000 in Human Resources Support Grants and contributed to a \$365,000 investment in workforce development.

With growing participation across North, Central and Tropical North Queensland, the program continues to empower tourism businesses to build strong, sustainable teams for the future.

INDUSTRY SKILLS AND JOBS ADVISOR PROGRAM

Throughout the year, QTIC collaborated closely with industry leaders and employers across Queensland to identify emerging workforce trends and regional skill needs. Insights gathered through the Industry Skills and Jobs Advisor program directly informed government priorities and investment decisions.

Throughout the financial year, QTIC led the Industry Skills and Jobs Advisor (ISJA) program, helping to ensure Queensland's tourism, hospitality, travel and events sectors have the skilled people they need to thrive.

At its heart, the program listens to industry. The ISJA team speaks directly with tourism operators, trainers and regional leaders to understand the real challenges and opportunities faced by people working on the ground.

These insights are then shared with government and training providers to guide workforce planning, shape policy and improve training pathways.

Through more than 130 consultations and the work of three dedicated *Industry Reference Groups*, the program helped influence key reforms, from new traineeship opportunities in events to expanded Fee-Free TAFE access.

Over the financial year, the Industry Skills and Jobs Advisor program delivered a wide range of impactful outcomes to strengthen Queensland's tourism, hospitality, and events workforce.

Central to this work was the activation of three dedicated Industry Reference Groups (IRGs), covering Accommodation, Dining and Hospitality, Attractions, Experiences and Events, and Travel, Tourism and Visitor Services.

These groups brought together employers, regional leaders and sector experts, ensuring that workforce planning and policy recommendations were grounded in accurate and regionally informed intelligence.

The IRGs also played a critical role in analysing and validating industry data, forming the evidence base that shapes the Industry Skills and Jobs Advisor program's strategic advice to the Queensland Government.

The advocacy work of the program contributed to several important vocational education and training (VET) policy changes in 2024-25:

- Reclassifying Certificate III in Events as a traineeship
- Securing Fee-Free TAFE access for critical industry courses
- Ensuring the inclusion of higher-level maritime qualifications to the *Queensland Priority Skills List*
- Supported the reclassification of occupations to better reflect tourism and hospitality roles
- Identified key actions to strengthen and sustain the VET workforce
- Provided advice to help improve school pathways for students interested in tourism and hospitality careers
- The retention of key occupations on both national and state occupational lists

Together, these achievements reflect a productive and forward-focused year for the program, helping build a stronger and more resilient workforce for Queensland's visitor economy.

GATEWAY TO INDUSTRY SCHOOLS PROGRAM

Queensland's next generation of tourism and hospitality professionals is already stepping up. Through hands-on learning and real industry connections, the Gateway to Industry Schools Program is turning curiosity into confidence and passion into future careers.

This financial year, QTIC proudly became the delivery partner for the Gateway to Industry Schools Program – Tourism and Hospitality, a statewide initiative helping young Queenslanders take confident steps toward rewarding careers in tourism, hospitality and events.

The program creates a meaningful bridge between classrooms and careers, offering students and teachers valuable access to industry connections, training and hands-on learning experiences. Participants explore the industry in exciting and practical ways through mixology workshops, Indigenous cooking masterclasses, farm to fork dinners and winery laboratory sessions guided by leading winemakers.

More than 1,500 students from 82 Queensland schools have taken part in the program, joining hotel tours, career expos and familiarisation visits across the state. Teachers also benefited from professional development workshops and workplace tours in Far North Queensland, gaining real-world insights to take back to their classrooms.

For tourism and hospitality businesses, the program presents a rewarding opportunity to inspire young people, connect with schools and educators, showcase career pathways and help build a passionate, capable and future-ready workforce for Queensland's vibrant visitor economy.

REGISTERED TRADE SKILLS PATHWAY PROGRAM

Queensland's kitchens are brimming with potential and QTIC's Registered Trade Skills Pathway program is helping that talent rise. By turning experience into opportunity, the program is shaping the next generation of skilled chefs across the state.

Chefs are the creative force that brings every kitchen to life. Yet with Queensland's hospitality industry facing record job vacancies, particularly for skilled culinary professionals, the demand for qualified chefs has never been greater.

To help meet this need, QTIC proudly delivers the Registered Trade Skills Pathway program, a flexible and accessible way for casual cooks to gain formal chef qualifications. The program recognises and values the experience participants already have, turning real-world kitchen skills into nationally recognised credentials.

Unlike traditional trade pathways, this program adapts to the realities of hospitality work. Cooks

can continue their training even if they change employers, move to another region or take time out between jobs. This flexibility has made it an industry game changer, opening doors for passionate cooks who might otherwise have found qualification out of reach.

By supporting aspiring chefs to grow, train and stay connected to the industry they love, QTIC is helping to build a stronger and more sustainable future for Queensland's hospitality sector, one skilled chef at a time.

QTIC continued to embed First Nations culture and perspectives across our programs, events and workforce initiatives. QTIC's focus remains on supporting growth and opportunity for First Nations tourism operators while deepening industry-wide understanding for the world's oldest living cultures.

QTIC began an important chapter in partnership with The University of Queensland and the Queensland First Nations Tourism Council, leading the co-design of the Queensland First Nations Tourism Plan 2026–2032.

This statewide initiative is grounded in listening and collaboration. Throughout the year, consultation sessions were held on Country across seven regions, from Mackay and Toowoomba to Thursday Island and Airlie Beach. Each session brought together Traditional Owners, First Nations tourism operators, community members and industry representatives to share perspectives, aspirations and priorities for the future of First Nations tourism.

These initiatives are proudly supported by the National Indigenous Australians Agency and Queensland Government through the Strategic Indigenous Tourism Projects fund

These consultations formed the foundation for a truly community-led vision. The engagement process was strengthened by a Regional Destination IQ Forum held in Mount Isa, which provided a powerful platform for regional voices to be heard. Hosting the Forum in Mount Isa created greater access and representation for remote and regional communities, ensuring their experiences, priorities and aspirations were reflected in the development of the Plan. The gathering spotlighted local perspectives, with participants sharing how tourism can celebrate culture, build opportunity and honour connection to Country.

The Queensland First Nations Tourism Plan 2026–2032 will set the framework to grow a vibrant and sustainable First Nations tourism sector. It aims to inspire the creation of authentic, culturally grounded experiences while promoting greater participation of First Nations peoples across all areas of the industry.

The Plan will also outline practical steps to ensure First Nations tourism can share in the opportunities presented by the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games, strengthening Queensland's identity as a place of deep culture and welcome.



Indigenous Champions Network

The QTIC Tourism Indigenous Champions Network brings together Indigenous and non-Indigenous operators committed to advancing First Nations tourism in Queensland. The Network meets regularly to address key industry issues and now includes 45 Champions.

Centered around the national NAIDOC theme for 2024, Keep the Fire Burning. Blak, Loud & Proud, the event explored the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander priorities of today and led a dialogue on truth-telling and healing.

Guests heard from Waanyi and Kalkadoon man, Joshua Creamer, a barrister at the helm of the newly established Truth-telling and Healing Inquiry in Queensland, who led an inspirational conversation on the powerful impact of confronting past hurts and transgressions.

The then Minister for Indigenous Australians, the Hon Linda Burney MP, echoed the sentiments of Joshua in urging guests to unite in addressing uncomfortable pasts to deliver a better tomorrow for all Australians.



QUEENSLAND TOURISM AWARDS

The Queensland Tourism Awards, the most prestigious event on Queensland's tourism calendar, are delivered by QTIC to honour the achievements of exceptional industry businesses, events and individuals.

The Queensland Tourism Awards program is more than a celebration of success; it is a structured capability initiative aligned with the national Quality Tourism Framework. Through the awards process, participating operators review their business against best-practice criteria, strengthen their systems and strategy, and benchmark themselves against peers.

Queensland's award categories are aligned with the Australian Tourism Awards, ensuring a clear pathway from state to national recognition. Nationally aligned category winners gain automatic entry into the Australian Tourism Awards, meaning high-performing businesses can be recognised on the national stage without needing to re-enter. This alignment supports consistency in standards and provides a powerful incentive for continuous improvement across the state.

The Queensland Tourism Awards returned in 2024 for an evening of glitz and glam at Brisbane's The Star Queen's Wharf, following another ground-breaking year for Queensland tourism operators. There were 31 award categories ranging from attractions, events, tours and transport operators, accommodation, restaurants, accessible tourism, culture and marketing. Across these 31 categories, tourism operators were awarded 80 awards, including 31 Gold, 25 Silver and 24 Bronze.

Twelve first-time entrants were celebrated across the Gold, Silver and Bronze categories, including Brisbane's very own Vertigo, voco

Brisbane City Centre and Sonia Jones Travel. Their success highlights how the awards program supports both emerging and established businesses to refine their operations, improve visitor experiences and lift their overall capability through the Quality Tourism Framework.

Individual excellence was also recognised. Elizabeth Hackett received The Marie Watson-Blake Award for Outstanding Contribution by an Individual. Elizabeth is Executive Chair of Australian Adventure Tourism Group, which has owned and operated tourism assets in Queensland for more than 20 years. A visionary leader in sustainable tourism, Chelsea Handley, owner of Barefoot Tours and founder of Allbout Cairns, was awarded The Stephen Gregg Bursary for Young Achiever of the Year in recognition of her strong advocacy for responsible and regenerative practices.

From the many awards presented on the night, four businesses were inducted into the Queensland Tourism Awards Hall of Fame:
Sea World Cruises Dining Experiences, BIG4
Adventure Whitsunday Resort, Mitchell Grass
Retreat and The Reef House Adults Retreat. Hall of Fame recognition is reserved for operators who achieve Gold in their category for three consecutive years, demonstrating sustained excellence and long-term commitment to quality.

The connection between the Queensland and national awards remained strong. At this year's Qantas Australian Tourism Awards, which celebrated its 40th anniversary in Adelaide in early 2025, Queensland operators achieved outstanding results, accepting 12 accolades across 26 award categories, including six Gold, three Silver and three Bronze. BIG4 Adventure Whitsunday Resort was inducted into the prestigious national Hall of Fame after securing Gold for three consecutive years in the Caravan and Holiday Parks category.

Together, the Queensland Tourism Awards and the national program form a powerful capability pathway. By aligning with the Quality Tourism Framework, they encourage operators to continually lift standards, innovate and invest in the quality of their products, experiences and business practices, ensuring Queensland remains a leader in Australian tourism.

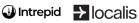




































QUEENSLAND TOP TOURISM TOWN AWARDS

Now in its fifth iteration, the QTIC Queensland Top Tourism Town Awards celebrate the state's diverse and outstanding regional destinations. Honouring towns that work together with their tourism operators and local community to make their destination the best it can be.

The state's best holiday hotspots and local treasures were revealed at the 2025 Queensland Top Tourism Town Awards in Brisbane, with Bowen, Airlie Beach and Town of 1770 claiming the top gong.

After an extensive judging process by tourism experts and a public vote that attracted more than 7,000 votes, Queensland's top holiday destinations were announced from a shortlist of 17 finalists.

Opening the vote to the public through a statewide campaign, allowed us to showcase the wide range of extraordinary regional destinations on offer to holidaymakers and weekend warriors.

Across three hotly contested award categories, regional destinations were crowned the best in Queensland based on population size. With a population over 5,000, the coastal icon of Bowen was named the 2025 Queensland Top Tourism Town.

For a fourth consecutive year, Airlie Beach took out the top honours for Queensland Top Small Tourism Town with a population between 1,500 and 5,000. And, they may be small, with a population under 1,500, but Town of 1770 is
